SOUTH SIDE

ESPERANZA

Esperanza, on the southern coast, boasts the deep aqua and crystal clear waters of the Caribbean Sea gently lapping along a picturesque walkway known as the Malecón. NORTH SIDE

ISABEL II

Bordered by the wavy blue of the Atlantic, the north side offers a loosely organized configuration of main and side streets, churches, stores, bars, restaurants, shops and municipal offices, all loosely draped around the Plaza, a community square for great gatherings all year round. Charming and colorful, Isabel II ("town" or "el pueblo" to the residents) is named after the first

reigning female monarch of Spain. Sitting like a decorated cake high above the town is the Fortin Conde de Mirasol, the last Spanish fort built in the Americas.

A TWIST OR A TAP






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PEBBLES IN OUR SHOES

LETTER FROM THE EDITOR

Every so often, life offers enlightening moments, reminders to pause, breathe, and live fully in the present. These lessons often come from the very young or the very old, who seem to naturally understand the rhythms of the world. In the hustle of our daily lives, many of us let small problems occupy our thoughts, like pebbles in our shoes that we don't take the time to rid ourselves of.

Walking to Playa Negra for this issue's cover photoshoot, I had the privilege of rediscovering this truth through the eyes of a spirited four-year-old named Thiago. As we followed the arroyo's stream, Thiago bounced and splashed like a tiny frog, his energy boundless, his joy contagious. His chatter flowed as freely as the water, and his mother commented on how much English he was speaking—and I realized what a brilliant young mind I was dealing with, much like my own daughter, Sky.

"Do you know the sound a crab makes?" he asked, leaning in close. Then, pulling my face next to his I listened and waited, he made barely a sound. In that moment, I was transported into his magical world.

At one point, I mentioned how the small pebbles in my shoes were bothering me. "Just jump into the stream like this," as he splashed both feet down. "This water is so wet—it just washes them away." And he was right.

When we reached Playa Negra, the magnetic pull of the black sand dropped Thiago to his knees. He dug his hands into the mineral-rich earth as if it nourished his very soul. He ran, jumped and laughed, his joy radiating outward, a reminder of the unfiltered freedom we often suppress as adults.

After a few photographs, there was an abrupt change in mood, which had him stomping off nearly in tears of frustration at not being free to play—a display of raw, unbridled emotion that only a child can express so honestly. I asked if I could reward him with something for modeling—maybe ice cream? He requested a dinosaur. Either a Brachiosaurus or a Parasaurolophus would do.

We waited for the best light while the sun was setting, and as we packed up the gear, we realized that we would be walking back out through the arroyo in the dark, carrying all our equipment. It was a small problem, easily washed away by the "wet water" and Thiago's imaginative spirit of adventure. "You KNOW," he said, "if you were an octopus, you could carry all that gear AND me." He was right again. I managed the gear into one hand so I could hold his little hand with my other.

When you explore Vieques, let the island's magnetic pull seduce you. Let the pebbles in your shoes remind you of life's small irritations—and how easily they can be washed away by nature's stream. Jump in with both feet. Splash, laugh, and let the world's raw beauty guide your spirit. The magic of Vieques, its people and nature have a way of grounding you, of reminding you what truly matters and how easily the stresses and pebbles of life could slip away if we let them, carried downstream by the "wet, wet water" and washed clean by moments of pure wonder.

When we got to the car, Thiago once again pulled my face close to his and whispered, "I love you." In that quiet moment, surrounded by the fading light of the day, the sounds of nature settling into evening, I felt the promise of this island, and the future, in a way that words can barely capture. Wild curiosity, unguarded love, untamed joy, unbridled emotion—all of it mirrored in that tiny whisper and in the magic of Vieques itself, with nature guiding our way.

GETTING **HERE**

Yes , Vieques is a separate island and no, you cannot drive from Puerto Rico.

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Publico Vans are located outside baggage claim at SJU and can seat up to 10-12 people. They are managed by Puerto Rico Tourism and you will be supplied an invoice for your trip before getting in the van.

FERRY

FERRY FROM CEIBA TO VIEQUES

Requires 1 hour 15 min taxi ride from San Juan International (SJU) to Ceiba (aprox. \$100) Ferry ticket \$2 or you can purchase ahead of time on www. puertoricoferry.com with additional fees for luggage. There are additional charges for carry on items such as coolers, surfboards, beach chairs, etc. Be prepared to wait or possibly be bumped if ferry is full! Vieques residents are seated first. It is not uncommon for the ferry to be late.

TICKETING

Tickets are available online at www.puertoricoferry.com for about half of the passenger seats. Once those are sold, one must buy the tickets at the terminal. The procedure is, as the inventory of available tickets reaches 35, only local residents are allowed to purchase them.

TIPS FOR TRAVELERS

- Duy tickets ahead of time online whenever possible.
- Control Rented vehicles are not permitted on the cargo boats.
- Dring a sweater on the ferry! It can be chilly with the AC.
- The Ceiba terminal has a seating priority system, giving preference first to elderly and disabled individuals, followed by local residents, and then tourists. While this

system might seem unwelcoming to travelers, it is essential to remember that many residents depend on the ferry for crucial trips related to health, education, or work, and rely on it to return to their families.





Insider recommendation: During high tourism season the ferry can fill up fast and residents get first boarding priority. If you don't want to chance being left at the ferry dock waiting hours for the next ferry or possilbly even overnight, book a fligh from one of the three airports!



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There are many rental car companies all within the same price range. Most offer Jeeps or SUVs to get you to the most remote beaches, but just because it's 4wd doesn't mean you can't get stuck. Vieques has some world-class potholes that are surpris-

ingly deep. When parking at the beach don't leave valuables in the car, and leave the car unlocked. At Sun Bay do not park on the ocean side of the road,



only in the grass on the opposite side. When returning cars you will be charged for wet seats, so think twice about leaving the top off the jeep. Make sure you rent from a licensed car rental company. Book early!

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▶ BIKE RENTAL: Bikes can be rented by the hour or day. If you plan on using a bike as transportation make sure you research mileage on Google maps. Also, be aware that most beach roads are dirt, gravel or sand with some steep inclines. Hot, dusty roads; and be careful around stray dogs. Always have water!

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


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CAMPING

SUNBAY - Campsites at Sunbay National Park include a view of the ocean and a mile stretch of sandy beach and turquoise water. The unfenced field to the right of the Sun Bay administrative building (as you face the shore) is the designated area to pitch tents. Camping is \$10.00 per night and check-in/out is coordinated through the Reserve Manager or other staff. There are open outdoor showers and a public bathroom, but bring your own supplies and paper products. Currently, the fencing for the camping area is partially down, so horses roam in. Check in at the Administrative Office at Sun Bay or try calling the municipal offices at 787-741-5000.

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

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

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A FREE

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SOUTH SHORE BEACHES

SUNBAY Accessible by the gated entrance off 997, Sunbay is a one mile stretch of beach. Sunbay has lifeguards and bathhouse. There is an entrance fee of \$2-\$4 depending on time of year.

MEDIA LUNA Enter the gated entrance off 997 at Sunbay. Follow the dirt road at the end of Sunbay and travel 0.6 more miles to Media Luna. Great for small children, Media Luna is shallow. You can walk 30 ft out into the water and still be in waist deep water.

NAVIO Follow directions to Media Luna but pass Media Luna and take a left at the sign - go another 0.3 miles. The road is extremely rough and 4wd is sometimes required. Go into the cave on the left side of the beach (if facing the water) for an excellent photo spot! There's good surf so bring your boogie board!

ESPERANZA BEACH To the east and west of the sugar pier in Esperanza. Local hangout where families gather and kids jump from the end of the sugar pier or snorkel underneath.

PLAYA EL COCAL Leave Esperanza on Route 996 heading west. After passing the Vieques Guesthouse on your right, look for a driveway just before the gate of Villa Encantada. Take this dirt road, which curves to the right, to reach the grassy parking area. This beach often has horses roaming around, so be sure to bring your camera! Playa El Cocal is rocky with strong waves and currents. For a stunning view of Esperanza, take a short hike around the rocky outcrop. Wear shoes!

PLAYA NEGRA (BLACK SAND BEACH) Leave Esperanza on 996 going west. Come to T (201) and take left. Drive 0.1 mile and look for the Playa Negra sign at the trail head. Drive 100 feet more to the parking lot across from Gallery Oro. Walk down the path to the dried stream bed and follow to the right. It is about a 20 minute walk to the beach. If it has rained, stream bed will actually be a small stream. Bring bug spray and water.

VIEQUES NATIONAL WILDLIFE REFUGE*

CARACAS* From 997, turn into the Vieques
National Wildlife Refuge at Km Marker 3.2. Go 2.6
miles to a sign for Caracas. Turn right and go .7
more miles. Little shade except for picnic gazebos
in the grass area. Watch out for the sandburs!
Be very careful where you step when you are in
the grassy area and kids should wear their shoes
down to the sand (or water's edge).
Note: Only park in the parking lot,
and not in the entire cul-de-sac at the

very end, to avoid fines. It is only for

emergency vehicle turn around.

PLAYUELA* From 997, turn into the Wildlife Refuge at Km Marker 3.2. Go 2.6 miles to the brown sign for Caracas. Turn right and go .6 mile to brown sign for Playuela and Tres Palmitas. Turn right and drive .1 mile to parking area for the Playuela Trail. Walk 10 min on a shaded trail and you're there!

PATA PRIETA* From 997, turn into the Wildlife Refuge at Km Marker 3.2 and go aprox 2 miles. Pass turn to Caracas and continue straight on dirt road for aprox 1 mile and turn right at Pata Prieta sign. After 0.2 miles, follow the road to the right to a small parking area with sign. Walk down the (slippery) gravel path to the left of the sign to the beach. Bring a beach umbrella as there is little shade!

LA CHIVA* From 997, turn into the Wildlife Refuge at Km Marker 3.2 and go aprox 2 miles to the end of the paved road. Pass the sign for Caracas and continue straight on the dirt road. La Chiva has numbered spots #1-20. At marker #12 the road splits so stay right if you want to explore La Chiva spots #16-21. There are composting toilets at #3 & #12.

LA PLATA* Follow directions to La Chiva but when road splits take left and go 0.5 miles to reach La Plata. Parking lots/entrances are from #21-26. La Platita is the natural boat ramp at the end of the road.



ON THE WEST SIDE

PLAYA GRANDE* Leave Esperanza on 996 going west and come to a T (rt. 201). Take a left. Go 1 mile to where the road dead ends and take a left. Follow road to the bottom of the hill, where you will be entering the southwest area of the Wildlife Refuge. Take a right onto dirt road to find a beach spot. Great beach for walking. Playa Grande is a turtle nesting beach so be sure to keep dogs on a leash and watch out for roped off nests. If you follow the dirt road west, you will run into the rugged Punta Vaca beach area. Good for hiking and nature exploration, but not safe for swimming.

PUNTA ARENAS* Follow directions to Rompeolas on the north shore but go past turn for pier and drive approximately 2 miles. You will come to a sign that says you are entering northwest area of the Wildlife Refuge. Drive 1 mile and come to a T / there are spots to the left and to the right with the best snorkeling to your left. Make sure to bring water and bug spray. No-see-ums come out in the late afternoon.

NORTH SHORE BEACHES

SEA GLASS BEACH Drive into Isabel II on 200 and make a left onto main street (Calle Muñoz Rivera). Almost at the end of the street you will see an intersection with a church on your right. Make a left here and at the next intersection make a right. Park on the street (not in the yellow!) and walk to the left of the gazebo down a path to the beach.

LA CHATA Drive by the ferry on your left and go up the steep hill to the right of El Yaté Bar. Go by the lighthouse on your left and take the next right down a steep little hill. Curve to your left and follow along this shoreline road. Pass La Lanchita on left and drive aproximately 0.35 miles to a left turn onto a small dirt drive with two palms and large rocks at the end. La Chata! Keep your eyes open for sea glass. Don't be surprised if you are swimming with horses! Many people come here to exercise them.

EL GALLITO Go west on 200 toward the airport and look for a parking area and short peninsula on your right. The most accessible beach is on the right. Great place to be at sunset!

EL PARQUE CEIBA Go west on 201 approximately 1 mile past the airport and follow the sharp curve to the right. Go down a small hill and the Ceiba tree is on your right. Enjoy the Ceiba tree without climbing, marking or damaging the roots.

ROMPEOLAS Follow directions to the Ceiba tree but pass the Ceiba and continue on the main road to the left. Take the next right at the empty concrete structure with parking lot and this road will take you to the pier. Rompeolas pier is 1 mile long so it is great for beginning joggers or walkers! Great snorkeling on the left side of the pier but go with a guide. Twice a day the cargo barge docks at Rompeolas so you will find traffic in the early morning and late evening.

BLAYDIN BEACH OR MOSQUITO BEACH Follow directions to the pier but right before going out onto the pier there is a small sandy road to the left that leads to a shallow beach.

No-see-ums = sandflies that come out at sunset and they bite!



Watch out!

for the Coast Sandbur - *Cencrus incertus* - very prevelant at Caracas and Pata Prieta and painful to step on.

RECYCLE ON VIEQUES

Currently dry cardboard, washed plastic and aluminum cans are recycled (aluminum and plastic does not need to be separated).

DROP OFF LOCATIONS

- At the end of Calle Regimiento 65 de Infanteria at Public Works Office. Drive down Calle Muñoz Rivera (main street of Isabel II) toward the ocean. Take the last possible left onto Calle Plinio Peterson. At the next intersection make a right onto dead end and the recycling is at the Public Works building on the left.
- Bunker 403 on the West Side of Viegues on 994 serves as the recycling center. Past the airport, Parque La Ceiba and Crab Island Rum Distillery, the left turn to the recycling center is aprox 1 mi. past distillery. Look for painted, pallet signs. The recycling center is the third bunker on the right. Leave your bagged recycables on the loading dock or in bins located at the entrance. Make a day of it by visiting the Ceiba tree, Rompeolas pier, Crab Island Rum Distillery and then visit the bunkers stopping at Bunker 403 to recycle!

40 YEARS

HOW VCHT IS PROTECTING VIEQUES FOR GENERATIONS TO COME

From preserving the brilliance of the Bio Bay to empowering future conservationists, the Vieques Conservation and Historical Trust has spent four decades proving that small efforts can lead to extraordinary change.

When you're walking along the Malecon, it's easy to miss the modest building that serves as the headquarters of the Vieques Conservation and Historical Trust (VCHT), but if you've taken a Bio Bay tour, snorkeled in the Vieques Wildlife Refuge, or explored the Playa Grande Sugar Mill Ruins, then you're familiar with what they do. Since 1985, the small-but-mighty team of dedicated scientists, conservationists, and community organizers that make up this nonprofit organization have been finding ways to nurture Vieques' most important resources,

from the algae that makes the Bio Bay glow to the kids who are learning how to become the next generation of environmental stewards on Vieques and beyond. "We are an organization made up of wonderful people who are very committed to the cause, very hardworking, and very happy to be doing what we're doing." says Colleen McNamara, President of the Board of Directors, who has been an active member of the organization for over 25 years.

Tasked with a broad mission to foster, protect and conserve the environment, archaeology and culture

of Vieques, VCHT's purvue has evolved to include initiatives as diverse as restoring seagrass beds, establishing resiliency centers for emergency preparedness, and advocating for the island on Capitol Hill. While wide ranging, these efforts share one essential thread. "The Trust is proving that humans are a variable that can mitigate change," says Mark Martin-Bras, director of community relations and field research. "We don't just sit there and complain about things. We're showing that Vieques is a place where people take action."



GUARDIANS OF THE BAY

VCHT has transformed the way that the island's visitors and residents interact with Puerto Mosquito, the world-famous Vieques bioluminescent bay. In 2012, the Trust implemented a two-week pilot program to train Bio Bay guides on safety and educate them on essential topics like

the science behind the light-producing plankton, the reasons that Puerto Mosquito is the brightest bioluminiscent bay in the world, and the impor-



tance of the surrounding mangrove forest in maintaining the Bay's delicate ecosystem. The program has been successfully replicated ever since, training hundreds of guides who have shared the beauty of the bay with hundreds of thousands of visitors. The Trust also helped design the infrastructure to ensure that the Bio Bay remains a sustainable tourist attraction that continues to dazzle onlookers and engage scientists, who come from as far as the United States, Europe, South America and other Caribbean islands to study this natural wonder.

The red streetlights that minimize light pollution around Vieques are another initiative directly tied to the Trust. As a founding member of the Puerto Rico Light Pollution Task Force, VCHT members even helped write a law that classified the entire island of Vieques as a high-value zone with the strictest of regulations. "We also worked with Para La Naturaleza and the University of Puerto Rico on a NASA sponsored project to create a GIS of all of the lights that can be seen from the bay," says Mark. One of their scientific advisors, renowned architect Fernando Abruña, helped redesign the Lujan Sports Complex lighting plan.

However, human interference is just one obstacle to ensuring a bright future for the Bay. After the

devastating 2017 hurricane season, scientists from the University of Puerto Rico estimated that it would take 30 years for the 6,000 red mangroves that were lost to be restored naturally. "Everyone in the room looked at each other and said, 'no, we have to do something!" says Lirio Márquez D'Acunti, VCHT's executive director. The organization embarked on The Mangrove Project to repopulate these important plants, which started with designing a system to grow mangroves in a controlled environment

that gave them the greatest chance of survival. Through a lot of trial and error, they have so far replanted over over 2,000 mangroves – nursed from propagule to sapling before being planted. "Then we discovered that it was not just the mangrove forest, but also the seagrass beds. So we embarked

on restoring that, too," Lirio adds. Another project is in the works to revive the coral reefs that protect the entrance to Puerto Mosquito.

With climate change making the weather more and more volatile, the Trust has pivoted significant focus into emergency preparedness. In addition to maintaining two fully equipped resiliency hubs and communication centers on the island, the VCHT Resiliency Project empowers the community through education and training in radio operation, first aid, information distribution, and coodina-



tion with neighboring islands. In 2020, VCHT even became a founding member of the Climate Strong Islands Network, a coalition of organizations doing advocacy and education to promote just policies that support island communities facing climate change-related dangers.

CREATING FUTURE CONSERVATIONISTS

For the kids in Vieques, summer means Manta, VCHT's camp for ages 5 to 17. Campers spend days exploring their island on land and in the water, along with nights adventuring on the Bio Bay or camping out the Cayo. "The MANTA experience was unique because it introduced us to parts of the island that we weren't aware of living here our whole lives," says 14-year-old Sky Diaz, who participated for 8 years and is the daughter of our proud-mom editor, Kelly Thompson.

Since MANTA was founded in 2006, thousands of Viequense youngsters have participated, and several have gone on to become Bio Bay guides and study science both on and off the island. "The image of being able to become a marine biologist and wildlife manager first popped up in my mind when I was eight years old as a participant in the first mini-Manta," comments Hatuey Connelly, whose grandmother, Myrna Pagan,

was a founding VCHT member. "Being a young kid interacting with Vieques' nature in a responsible way thanks to the guidance from the MANTA staff helped shape the image of what a grown version of me could

become." Now 22, Hatuey studies Wildlife Management and Marine Biology at the University of Puerto Rico in Humacao. "I hope to divulge the knowledge I gather from my time in university to Vieques and create coastal resiliency programs to protect the island and the people that mean so much to me." His ultimate goal is to found a natural science school for kids on Vieques, who often lack resources and access to advanced educational opportunities.

To help address such disparities, VCHT administers scholarships for post-high school education, and to date, more than 100 Viequense students have received financial support to pursue areas as diverse as molecular science, nursing, law, and civil engineering. "Considering all of the limitations that Viequense students have academically and in terms of the cost to have experiences outside of Vieques, we are providing empowerment opportunities," says Mark. "But we are trying to also work within the system here, like learning what the students need."



In many ways, the work that the Trust does has helped put Vieques on the world's radar. On a macro scale, the organization has participated in public hearings, testified in front of the U.S. Senate and the Senate of Puerto Rico, collaborated with agencies and local governments about public policies for conservation, and been a vocal advocate

for protecting the natural resources of Viegues, Puerto Rico, and the bioluminescent bays of the world. "Whenever we go to these meetings or do Zoom calls, everybody is so surprised that we are so tiny and we do so much," says Lirio. If they were familiar with Vieques, however, they might not be so surprised. "The people of Vieques are many times misunderstood by people who are not Viequense. They'll fight to preserve their space."

Supporting that deep sense of love and pride, VCHT often acts as a community organizer, running seminars on practical topics like compliance, budgeting, and grant writing to help other local nonprofits get off the ground and thrive. Says Mark, "As more of the community gets involved in taking action, it's no longer just the Trust doing things for this community. It's now the community doing things for itself through the Trust. That is so uplifting."

Reflecting on the past 40 years, it's hard to imagine where the island would be without VCHT. But perhaps it's more important to think about where will Vieques be 40 years from now because of the

Trust. "I think as Vieques faces massive social, environmental, and economic change, we want people to see all of the possibilities that come with taking action," Mark comments. "And action is the only thing that gives hope. \blacksquare



Walk 0.3 miles along Esperanza beach to Cayo de Tierra, the left of the two small

islands off Esperanza. It's less than a mile around the Cayo. We recommend starting early in the morning when most birds are active.

CELEBRATING 40 YEARS OF VCHT

For four decades, the Viegues Conservation and Historical Trust (VCHT) has protected Viegues' natural and cultural resources while inspiring future conservationists. From organizing cleanups to supporting thousands of students, VCHT has driven conservation, preservation and advocacy on Vieques. It has collaborated with universities, co-authored research, and advocated for policies at local, national, and international levels. As an active voice in public hearings and policy discussions, VCHT has shaped legislation and awareness to safeguard Vieques, Puerto Rico, and bioluminescent bays worldwide.

2018: To provide the community with resiliency and disaster preparedness, the VCHT established resiliency hubs in Esperanza and the Escuela Barbosa. Equipped with emergency radio communications, solar energy, potable water, and storm-proof storage, the hubs provide essential support and training to first responders and the community.

2017: In the wake of Hurricane Maria, VCHT provided internet, water, satellite phone service, and accompaniment to the community.

2016: Entered into an agreement with the Puerto Rico DNER to co-manage the Vieques Bioluminescent Bay Nature Reserve.

VCHT became part of a national coalition of scientists and professors that created the ASPIRE (Active Societal Participation in Research and Education) approach.

2015: Hosted the first bilingual forum on light pollution, tackling the threat to the bioluminescent bay head-on and creating innovative solutions to preserve its magic.

Published groundbreaking bird research in the Journal of Caribbean Ornithology, sharing 32 years of data in a special issue on the Birds of Vieques Island, Puerto




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Playa Negra is more than just a beach—it's a testament to the natural forces that have shaped Vieques into the vibrant, diverse island it is today. Its' blend of beauty, science, and adventure makes it a must-visit spot for anyone looking to connect with the island's unique character. Tucked away southwest of Esperanza, this beach requires a ½-mile hike through an arroyo (stream bed), which may have a small stream if it has recently rained. The beach is more for exploring than swimming, as the water here can be rough with strong currents.

WHAT MAKES IT BLACK?

The black sand is the result of shifting tectonic plates pushing magma up through the surface of high areas like Mount Pirata, the highest point on Vieques. The magnetic, heavy but fine sand washes off the mountain and down through the stream bed, creating the black sand beach. The sand is rich in magnetite, a mineral that comes from the volcanic rock found in Vieques' ancient geological formations. Over time, rain and streams have carried this black material down the hillsides to meet the lighter-colored sands of the coastline, creating a striking mix that shimmers in the sunlight. Depending on rains, the beach can be jet black or a mixture of the black sand and red limestone. If you scoop up a handful of Playa Negra's black sand, you will be surpriesed at how heavy it is. Magnetite has a density of approximately 5.2 grams per cubic centimeter, which is significantly higher than typical quartz sand (2.6 g/cubic centimeter). This makes magnetite-rich sand much heavier than ordinary beach sand.

Magnetite is composed of about 72.4% iron, making it one of the densest naturally occurring minerals on Earth. This high iron content increases the overall mass of sand containing magnetite.

This unique physical property adds to the

fascination of magnetic black sand beaches, making them a great place to explore geology in action!

INSIDER TIPS:

Mind the Heat: Black sand absorbs heat quickly. Wear shoes to protect your feet from the midday sun.

Plan to do more than one beach on the day you visit Playa Negra. You probably won't stay all day because it's not a swimming beach.






Blend all ingredients in food processor or blender. Pour into airtight container and refrigerate.

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

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
